Over the past few years, we have made a tremendous push to put outdoor, hands-on learning at the forefront of learning at MeANS. From starting our Blacksmithing and Woodworking programs this year on campus, to offering regular immersive overnights and outdoor projects during out Natural Science "Intensives", MeANS has had the opportunity to collaborate with some incredible partners including the Maine Local Living School, the Maine Environmental Education Association, Lenox Lodge, and MOFGA.

On February 27th, these organizations along with a collection of public schools, politicians, and

representatives from the Maine Department of Education, had the opportunity to come together to celebrate Outdoor Learning in the state of Maine. Four brave MeANS students joined in, taking part in a panel, chatting with Representative Bruce White, and listening to the impact that outdoor learning is having on young people from across the state.

"Making the Most of MeANS' Campus"

Threshold Monday, March 11th, 2024.

As most of you are aware MeANS has one of the most amazing campuses in Maine.

We have greenhouses, a sugar shack, a full-scale museum, blacksmithing and

woodworking spaces, bee hives, a one acre farm, and a Yurt.

This past Monday our Threshold program was held on campus making use of three

of these incredible facilities – our Sugar Shack, now in full syruping operation; the

LC Bates Museum, and our blacksmithing space.

The day began with students meeting with their teachers in an advisory session

then combining with another advisory to do an Itime activity which allowed

students to meet and learn a little about the other students in the program. Because

Threshold is a one on one home-based program, students don't have as much

chance to be with peers as the Campus program.

We then dove into the morning's activities – a visit to the LC Bates museum and our

very own Sugar Shack. The team that went to LC Bates were guided by Hannah and

Deb Staber through the museum's unbelievably varied and interesting collections. We learned a little bit about how trees work, and the kinds of challenges they face both natural and man-made.

The Sugar Shack experience was led by Sugar Shack co-founder, creator, and implementer – Jeff Chase who helped to start MeANS way back in 2011. Jeff explained to us how climate change is affecting the Sugaring season, and how the chemistry of making the best Maple Syrup works. We learned that the Indigenous people who lived in Maine for thousands of years had figured out how to tap trees. We learned how much a 5 gallon bucket filled with sap weighs as we had to carry them back from the trees which were tapped near the Sugar Shack.

The afternoon brought further learning experiences. Jeff who founded and is the



driving force behind our blacksmithing program taught Threshold students what goes into heating iron and bending it. A few students actually had a whack at it. Working with hot iron one learns a lot about heat and flexibility and hand eye coordination. Other students participated in our Luddite club, drawing and decorating without the use of any electronic implements. Some took part in our improvisation workshop honing their theatric skills, and yet others were involved in making tasty maple syrup ice cream with our own maple syrup.

Could there be a sweeter ending to the day? We were exposed to biology, physics, history, anthropology, interpersonal communication, visual and performing arts all in one Threshold Monday. Next one – we could be witnessing the solar eclipse, April 8th . Stay tuned!

Can We? Project: Final Collaborative Retreat

For the final time this year, our Can We? Cohort pulled together to wrap up the first year of our deep dive into civic engagement and the revitalization of our democracy.

Back in November, our first retreat took place in our Yurt on campus where students had an opportunity to build community, share stories about their lives, and strengthen their understanding of our shared humanity.



In December, our cohort headed to the Augusta Civic Center, where they joined 14 other schools across the state to explore and discuss an array of challenging topics including gun control, abortion, and environmental protection (*If you're interested in learning more check out this article on Maine Public Radio*).

But for our final retreat, our brave cohort of 18 decided that they would like to take it on collaboratively, so we hopped on the bus and made our way to the Ecology Learning Center, where the two cohorts shared about their experiences and forged new bonds.

For the final retreat, the focus was on bringing these discussions into the present day, and students spent time working through a collection of new legislation currently being reviewed in the state of Maine. The conversations were lively, and student honed their skills as facilitators and discussion leaders as they worked through differences in opinion and decided the fate of a series of bills collectively.

It was an incredibly rewarding experience for both schools, and already students left the day brainstorming how we could continue this collaboration in the years ahead.

Up next, we're headed to the New England Youth Identity Summit in Portland Maine, on April
